


Neil Nolte is now a "Published Author!"




Michael Martin also published his book



"I always wanted to tell this story, and as much as that, I wanted to hear an echo-what someone might think of it. This is a story of a long struggle with manic depression. It begins with its onset and follows through the years of the outlandish behavior, alcoholism, and violence characteristic of this disease. It caused a terrible disruption in the lives of those who were close to me. It continues on with some of the events that eventually led to me being committed to the New Mexico State Hospital.

Most importantly, it remembers the kindness of so many I knew along the way. It's also a story about the best and worst in people. It's about the kind and caring ones and the ones who have no caring at all. It's absolutely not your grandfather's bedtime story. Much of it is harsh and grim and, for me, well beyond. Nonetheless, it does have a happy ending.

"Blurbs, Pitches, and Tags"

Writing is great fun, but someday you'll want to be published. You'll need a thirty-word pitch to sell your masterpiece to an agent and/or publisher and convince your market readers they must buy your book. That book must have a back cover blurb, which also travels with it and serves as the book description on Amazon and Goodreads. While you're into these mind games, it would be good to devise a tag of as few words as possible—maybe 6 to 10. Something like movies have that grab attention and condense the essence of the film. Let's talk about the art of writing a blurb, a pitch, and a tag.

Lee Carver is a hybrid author in every sense: fiction and nonfiction, traditionally and independently published. As a freelancer, she does edits, formats, and uploads for others as well as writing her own novels. She sings alto in the choir, makes baby quilts with Quilting for Life, and gardens in partnership with her husband Darrel.
